I. COURSE TITLE, DESCRIPTION, OUTCOMES, RUBRICS, AND REQUIREMENTS

Course Title

THE 5635: Introduction to Divine Principle

Course Description

Key concepts related to True Parents' Thought (TPT) will be taught using the Bible as the main reference. The focus will be on how to share these concepts with a Christian audience, especially to clergy. The purpose is to help Christianity fulfill its God-given role which is to lead a global renaissance to create a marriage- and family-friendly culture worldwide. This course may well be called the *Cham Bumo Ron* for Christians.¹

The material in this course has been field-tested in numerous venues, including: the Philippines (the largest Christian nation in Asia); to Pacific Christian Leadership Conferences of the Asia Pacific region; during a 1-day international leaders' conference in Korea—via the support from the Regional President of the Asia Pacific region Pres. Masaichi Hori's letter to True Mother; shared the HTM missionaries in the Philippines; in a 2-day conference in Chicago, IL, USA; and during the 2024 HyoJeongRang workshop in Korea.

Course Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Nurture a deeper understanding and appreciation of the Bible and Christianity, as this course content was developed for Christian pastors and has extensive references from the Bible
- 2. Understand more fully, defend more concretely, and promote more confidently key elements related to the preparation and advent of the Messiah and his Bride according to TPT.
- 3. Grasp more clearly and substantially the important concepts and principles of TPT being developed under the guidance of Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon, the founder of HJI.
- 4. Have more self-assurance in knowing why it is essential we reach out to Christians to help them fulfill their God-given responsibility to usher in an interfaith culture that defends and promotes a monogamous, heterosexual marriage and two-parent family which are biblically sound and sociologically comprehensive.
- 5. Recognize the universality and interconnectedness of the two fundamental principles (dual purpose and pair system principles) and four family loves derived from True Parents' teachings, showing that these principle-based loves are not exclusively Christian since all religions seek good people and stable, loving families.

Course Requirements

This class will use the asynchronous format. Students are not expected to meet together with the instructor at scheduled times. Separately, for 12 of 15 weeks/modules, there will be a recorded lecture, a powerpoint, and an accompanying MS Word.doc which complement each other. All three need to be reviewed and studied. The other three weeks/modules will have a recorded message from the instructor only (not PPT or MS Word.doc).

Instead of face-to-face or zoom meetings, students will submit written assignments which will be graded (details below). There will also be Discussion Group interaction and this will be an important learning experience for both the students and the instructor. In addition, the instructor will periodically schedule a zoom meeting as an opportunity for students who are available to gather for discussion.

Students must have access to the stable Internet, a real computer (not just a smartphone), and Microsoft Word (free for students). iPads and similar Android devices allow you to perform many, but not all, of the required activities. Students must have the proper hardware/software (video camera, microphone, etc.) to participate in zoom interactive sessions (if available) and to record presentations. Students must practice proper netiquette in all course communications.

By Thursday of each week, students are expected to complete a weekly written summary assignment based on the topic for that class and post it on Canvas. In general, late assignments are not accepted, especially without prior notice and approval from the instructor. Therefore, a poorly written assignment is much better submitted rather than an incomplete.

II. GRADING

Your final grade will be based on the following:

- 1. Written Assignments 25%
- 2. Discussion Board Interaction 20%
- 3. Midterm Project/Essay 25%
- 4. Final Term Project/Paper 30%

Written Assignments: Over the 15-week semester there will be 12 written assignments for Modules 2-6 and Modules 8-14. The written assignment will be posted in the HJI Canvas by Thursday of each week. Students are to write a 400 - 500 word summary or commentary on the main points conveyed in the instructor's lecture and the reading assignment for the week. This essay may be in the form of personal reflections, comments, alternative ideas, constructive critiques, and/or question(s). These 12 written assignments are worth 25% of your final grade.

Discussion Board Interaction: Your interaction on the Discussion Board with short questions, comments, critiques, or responses with the instructor and among students will be a valuable opportunity for interaction, especially since this course is asynchronous. Posts will allow for valuable academic interaction and mutual learning. This will comprise 20% of your final grade.

Midterm Project Report: This will count for 25% of your final grade and there are two options:

The first possibility is that the student submits a pre-approved midterm project report of 1,000 words. This should be a more formal writing style but may also incorporate reflections, comments, alternative ideas, constructive critiques, and questions.

Alternatively, a student can post a recorded lecture presentation of 20 minutes on a topic or project approved by the instructor in advance.

Final Term Paper: Each student is expected to submit a final term paper/project. This will count for 30% of your final grade. There are also two options:

Option One: Final Term Paper of approximately 1,500 - 2,000 words properly footnoted, based on the readings and materials presented during the entire course. The topic <u>must</u> be approved in advance.

Option Two: A recorded presentation of approximately 20 minutes in length on a topic approved in advance and based on the material covered in the course.

Grades for the course will not be changed nor incompletes granted unless there are compelling circumstances that make competition of course requirements temporarily impossible for the student. Additional work submitted to improve grades after completion of the course will not be accepted.

Final Grades are recorded by letter, and are understood as follows:

- 4. **Plagiarism Detection**: This course uses Turnitin, which can detect AI-generated content. Any submission found to rely excessively on AI or lack proper citation will be subject to academic integrity review.
- 5. **Integrity**: Misuse of AI to bypass critical thinking or generate misleading content is considered academic dishonesty and will result in disciplinary action (see ACADEMIC INTEGRITY section above).
